

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER
PERRY WATER SYSTEM Chemical Monitoring Public Notice

What happened?

Our water system did not meet the requirements of a drinking water rule. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not your drinking water meets health standards. During the 2020 monitoring period, we did not monitor or test for Synthetic Organic Contaminants (SOCs) , and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of your drinking water at that time.

What should I do?

Some people who drink water containing Synthetic Organic Contaminants (SOCs) could become seriously ill. Any customers who are concerned about their exposure to these contaminants can choose alternative sources of water for ingestion.

What does this mean?

This is not an immediate risk. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately.

What is being done?

The City of Perry is flushing hydrants through the City.
